



Native American people have had to find animals in their natural habitats in order to survive. This activity is meant for children to understand where animals live, why they live there, and how they can be used for survival.

All of the images are animals, locations, and natural items that can be found in Connecticut. The students will be given Animal Cut-Outs and asked to place the animals on the matching Location Cut-Out. When the animals are placed, discuss why animals live in some habitats and not others. For example, fish can only breath underwater, birds have wings and other animals do not, and some animals need to hibernate or have sensitive eyes. For more advanced thinking, multiple Animal Cut-Outs can be used to show that animals use multiple habitats. Or, the Use Cut-Outs can be placed on the Animal and Location Cut-Outs and discussed. Feel free to replace cut-outs with stuffed animals, puppets, action figures, or to create your own!
